# FY 2026 Base Request – Cougar Cupboard Operational Funds

Cougar Cupboard opened in January 2020 serving close to 70 students a week prior to COVID-19. Since, the Cupboard has grown exponentially. In FY24, because of the generosity and support of the Student Fee Advisory Committee the cupboard transitioned to a new location in the University Lofts. In the short two months of open operation (i.e. April and May) the program distributed over 97,000 pounds of free food to over 3,200 student visitors per month. Even with the record-breaking service and usage, national research suggests that a campus our size should anticipate serving over double that many students.

Now settled into our new location, the current fall numbers project an average of over 2,000 to 2,500 visits per month. The exponential trends in utilization necessitate a robust base funding that can meet the current needs of students as well as support future growth for the Cougar Cupboard.

Currently, the funds we have are not sufficient to keep pace with the growing demand and needs of our student population. While the Cougar Cupboard has benefited greatly from the generosity and support of the Student Fee Advisory Committee, allowing for the relocation and physical expansion, these resources alone are not enough to sustain our operations long-term. The exponential increase in usage—now projected to exceed 800 student visits per week—has placed a significant strain on our budget, especially as we seek to open more days and increase access to vital resources.

Without base funding, we will struggle to meet the needs of our students, particularly those facing food insecurity, leading to fewer opportunities for support and resources for the growing number of students relying on the cupboard. Base funding is vital in ensuring we can continue to provide consistent, reliable access to food and essential services, allowing us to maintain current operations and prepare for future growth. This stable financial foundation is key to sustaining our mission of supporting student well-being, retention, and academic success.

Currently, the Cougar Cupboard has over 7,000 registered users and currently has over 500 students visit a week we project an average of over 800 visits per week to the Cougar Cupboard once we add more days that we are open in the following years. Considering this level of utilization, as well as the costs associated we are requesting additional funding to support the base operations of the Cougar Cupboard.

Meeting students' essential needs is directly tied to student success. Students experiencing basic needs insecurities are more likely to miss, fail and/or drop classes, are less likely to purchase needed textbooks, and more likely to leave their university altogether. In fact, over 38% of students who enrolled in the Cougar Cupboard reported had considered dropping out of the university due to financial concerns.

Support to this program will make a huge impact to hundreds of Cougars by helping them have what they need so that they can focus on their education.
