

NASW STANDARDS FOR SOCIAL WORK PRACTICE IN CHILD WELFARE

The NASW Standards for Social Work Practice in Child Welfare is a basic tool for social work practice in child welfare that might include family preservation and support, out-of-home care, family foster care, kinship care, residential group homes, adoption, independent living, child day care, adolescent pregnancy and parenting services, hospitals, and nontraditional settings such as faith-based facilities. HIGH CASELOADS: HOW DO THEY IMPACT DELIVERY OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES?

The NASW Social Work Policy Institute reviewed research related to caseloads, especially in child welfare agencies, and found that high caseloads can negatively impact both worker retention and service delivery outcomes. In addition, worker turnover is costly to agencies in terms of training and recruitment costs as well as the added stress on workers who remain.
